Question 7: The next major challenge for District 89 is addressing the growing infrastructure needs of our aging buildings. While this work isn't flashy, it is necessary to protect the community's investment in these buildings and provide our students an even safer, more comfortable, healthier, and more accessible place to learn and grow. **CODE**

While the district is doing the best they can with limited resources, they are stretched to the limit and work has been deferred as long as possible. It would take about 20 years to complete the needed work, but thanks to the district's fiscal responsibility bonds are being paid off in the coming years so these urgent infrastructure projects can be addressed while providing property tax relief for residents.

CCSD 89 is conducting community engagement efforts this school year to collaborate on a long-term infrastructure plan for our schools. While other districts pursue tax increases to build expensive new buildings, we will develop a fiscally responsible plan that protects our infrastructure, improves educational environments, keeps our students and teachers safe, and provides property tax relief. The next eleven questions are regarding these potential individual projects.

Do you support or oppose investing in Paving & Sidewalks? This would include replacing parking lots, sidewalks, signage, curbs, and drainage. This has been estimated to cost up to \$4.9 million.

Question 18: **As stated, the district's dedication to fiscal responsibility affords us a rare opportunity to tackle this challenge while achieving property tax relief for overburdened homeowners.** **CODE**

Because the district paid off a set of bonds that will expire in 2021, property taxes for district residents will already be reduced by an average of \$239 per year. The district has a second set of bonds set to expire in the coming years. We need to consider how much of this second set of bonds to renew so we can address urgent infrastructure projects while still providing property tax relief.

The final five questions are regarding this funding.

The first hypothetical funding level is the Low Funding Level, providing approximately \$12.7 million in funding for schools and resulting in an additional tax decrease of approximately \$143 per year for the average district home. Do you support or oppose this funding level?
