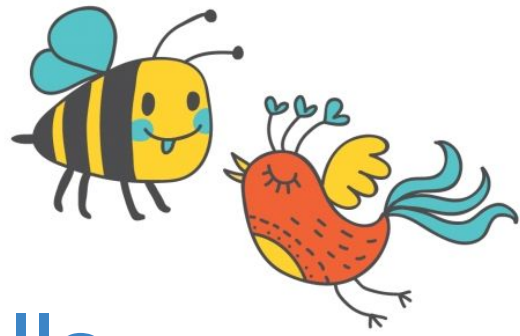


Reproductive System

until birth.

Puberty- Happens to literally EVERYONE!



Physical Changes

- Height
- Shape
- Acne
- Growth (muscles, anatomy/body parts, hair)
- Menstruation for females
- Nocturnal emission for males



Mental/Emotional Changes

- Hormones change
(testosterone=male and estrogen=female)
- Mood swings
- Feeling like you want to be more independent
- Feeling self-conscious



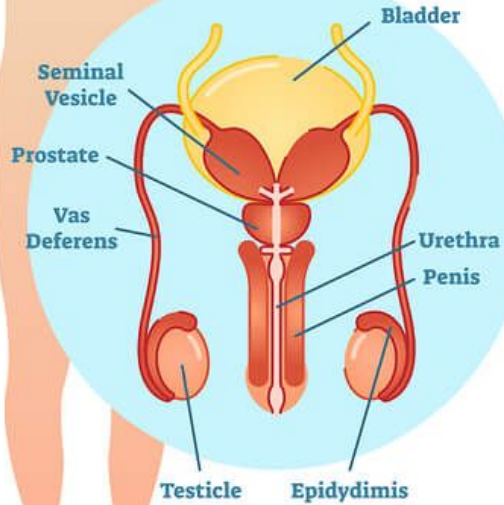
Social Changes

- Finding your identity

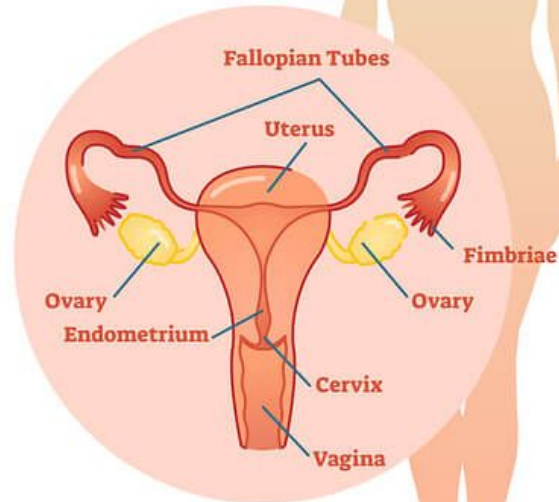


HUMAN REPRODUCTIVE SYSTEM

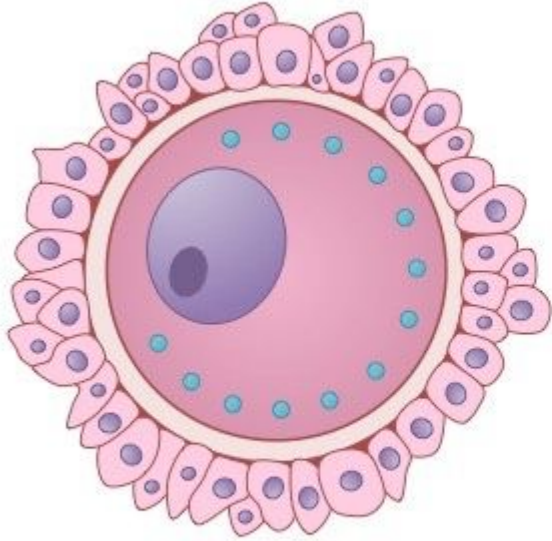
Male Organs



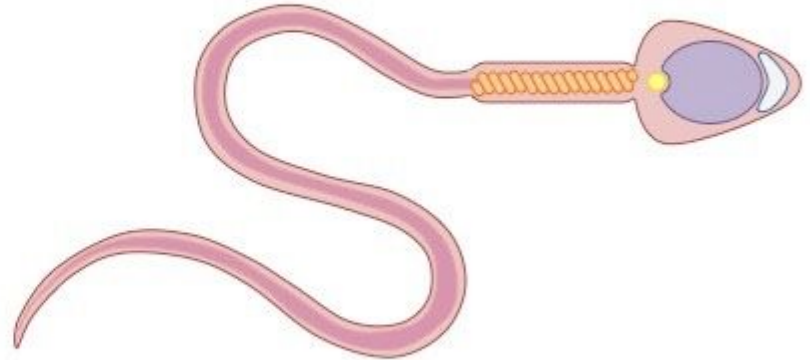
Female Organs

Basic Terminology

Ovulation: when a female releases an ova from her fallopian tube.

Menstruation: when a female is not pregnant and she releases the blood that would go to the baby.

Fertilization: when a male sperm meets a female ova and a baby is conceived (made).

Semen: sperm and fluid.

Ejaculation: semen that is released from (comes out of) the penis.

Nocturnal emission: “Wet dream”- when a male ejaculates in his sleep.
