It seems that the 2016-17 school year is flying by. Somehow, through snow and 70 degrees and then snow again, we have nearly arrived at spring break. In the classrooms, students have many challenges and much excitement left in their year. And in the District office, even as we work to close this school year strong, we have begun planning for the 2017-18 school year.

With that in mind, I wanted to give a brief update on the boundary plans. The District will address our imbalanced enrollment with new boundaries for the 2018-19 school year. The boundaries will be student centered, minimally disruptive, and fiscally responsible. To reach that goal, the District will reconvene the Enrollment Committee as a Boundary Committee before the end of this school year. The expanded committee will look at all data, building plans, and previous feedback to develop a sustainable plan that provides optimal outcomes for all students.

Our plan is to present a boundary-change recommendation to the Board of Education in October 2017, with the Board possibly taking action in December 2017. The new boundaries would go into place for the 2018-19 school year. During this process, the District will continue to communicate with all stakeholders through our website, social media sites, building newsletters, and PTC meetings.

At this time, we are working on ways to reduce the number of students who could lose instructional minutes in 2017-18 when they are bussed away from their home school to balance building enrollments. I appreciate all the families and staff members who have participated in this important process.

Here are some important reminders and celebrations:

Registration opens April 5 for returning students

Registration opened February 27 for students who will be kindergartners in the 2017-18 school year. If you have a student starting kindergarten next year, registration information can be found here. Registration for returning students will open at 6 a.m. April 5. More information is available here.

The District bases staffing decisions and other planning on having complete registration information, so I encourage all families to register as soon as possible. You can save \$10 per student by completing registration before April 30.
